Pre-Placement	Pre-placement is used to determine the appropriateness of a potential TFC placement.	Other
Respite	Respite is utilized when a child needs temporary care away from the foster family. This can be day or overnight.	Respite
Assessment Level	Children served at the assessment level of treatment foster care are those who are newly placed with a licensed child placing agency and for whom an assessment to determine the appropriate level of foster care services is being conducted. Level I	<p>The needs of a child served at Level 1 ongoing treatment foster care require monitoring or the LCPA may need to provide services to lessen the likelihood that identified needs will become more acute or return after being “resolved”. Children served at Level 1 will typically demonstrate a relatively low level of social/emotional/behavioral/medical/personal care needs or impairment for normal range of age and development. Areas of need may include but not be limited to, depression, anxiety, impulsivity, hyperactivity, anger control, adjustment to trauma, oppositional, substance use, eating disorder, physical health condition, developmental delay, or intellectual disability.</p> <p>Level I: twice monthly in the home visits</p>	Treatment Foster Care Case Management Maintenance- Basic and Enhanced

Level II	<p>The needs of a child served at Level 2 ongoing treatment foster care require that significant action (interventions, services, supports, etc.) be taken to address, remedy or ameliorate the identified needs. Children served at Level 2 will typically demonstrate a relatively moderate level of social/emotional/behavioral/ medical/personal care needs or impairment for normal range of age and development. Areas of need may include but not be limited to, depression, anxiety, impulsivity, hyperactivity, anger control, adjustment to trauma, oppositional, substance use, eating disorder, physical health condition, developmental delay, or intellectual disability.</p> <p>Level II: weekly with at least two in the home</p>	Treatment Foster Care Case Management Maintenance- Basic and Enhanced
<p>Level III General Explanation</p> <p>Level III Eligibility Criteria</p>	<p>Level III services has a general eligibility criteria. Once a youth is placed in Level III services, those services will have a specific focus. Each focus will aid the youth in moving closer to permanency or mental health stability. Billing for this level is a single price. Localities will purchase Level III services and will note their focus area on the POS form.</p> <p>Eligibility Criteria Children served at Level 3 will demonstrate a high level of social/emotional/ behavioral/medical/personal care/permanency planning needs or impairment for normal range of age and development. Level III Facilitation	the TFC worker, legal guardian, treatment providers, youth, family, and any other members of the treatment team. They are an unbiased third party who will coordinate with all team members, facilitate monthly treatment team meetings and complete detailed monthly plans for the youth and family. This service is informed by High-Fidelity Wraparound (HFW) but is NOT HFW.	
Non-Treatment	Children served at the non-treatment level of foster care may be developmentally on target, demonstrate age appropriate behaviors, able to participate in community activities without restriction, or be the sibling of a child who meets the criteria for ongoing TFC placement in the same foster home. Children shall be served at the Non-treatment Foster Care level if the assessment indicates treatment foster care services are not needed. Diligent Search	Diligent Search is a permanency enhancement intervention provided for children and youth in the child welfare system who have been disconnected from their families due to placement outside of their home, community and kinship network. Based on a national model, Diligent Search provides strategies to identify, locate and engage relatives in establishing permanent life-long connections for these children and youth. A variety of effective and immediate search techniques are utilized to identify no fewer than 40 relatives or meaningful connections for each youth. All identified relatives are invited to participate in a planning meeting to create multiple plans for youth regarding their essential needs for lifelong connections, support and affection. Upon the identification of relative placement	Other

	options, primary and backup plans will be created. All placement options will be assessed for placement appropriateness to include, an assessment of the families strengths, dynamics, needs, safety and risk issues.	
Traditions of Caring and Collaborating – Kinship Family Training	UMFS utilizes CWLA’s Traditions of Caring and Collaborating, (A Trauma Informed Model of Practice for Engaging, assessing, and Supporting Kinship Caregiving families) to provide individualized and child specific training and support to prepare kin for placement. Staff will facilitate information and support meetings for kinship caregivers and complete mutual family assessments of the kinship caregivers willingness, ability and resources to achieve the outcomes of child safety, well-being and permanence.	Other
Community Respite	Community Respite is designed to (1) provide temporary relief to the caretakers and (2) to protect the health, safety and welfare of a child on a short-term basis. Community Respite care will be offered as needed for the provision of temporary respite to primary caregivers for children who are not in full or partial custody of the Department of Social Services (DSS) with the potential aims of reducing family stress, preventing abuse and neglect, and/or supporting family stability.	Respite
Intensive Care Coordination	The UMFS ICC Program is designed to facilitate services for a youth and his/her family for the purpose of maintaining the youth in transitioning the youth to a family-based or community based setting. This service is designed for youth and families who have exhausted many other services and therefore requiring activities that are beyond the scope of regular case management services. ICC follows the High Fidelity Wraparound model, as endorsed by the Office of Children’s Services. ICC can be paired with the Family Support Partner service or offered stand-alone	Intensive Care Coordination

Family Support Partner	The FSP is someone with personal experience of having a child with serious behavioral or mental health issues who can use that experience to help other families currently receiving community services. The FSP is somebody who has “walked the walk,” and is willing to share his or her journey. The FSP has also received training in his or her role, in community resources, and the wraparound process. FSPs are employees with variable and flexible hours, depending on the needs of the families they serve. FSPs are trained in the High Fidelity Wraparound model. FSP can be paired with ICC or provided as a stand-alone service.	Other
Supervised Visitation	This program refers to contact between a non-custodial parent/family member(s) and one or more of his or her children in the presence of a UMFS Worker. The primary responsibility of the visit is to observe interactions and to ensure the safety of all participants. If the UMFS Worker ever feels that they or the child(ren)’s safety or well-being is at risk, the worker will end the visit and take any necessary steps to ensure the safety of the child(ren). The purpose of Supervised Monitored Visitations is to provide a safe supportive environment between the child(ren) and a non-custodial parent/family member(s), without the child(ren) being put in the middle of the parents’/family member(s) conflicts or other difficulties. This service is appropriate for families seeking to maintain family connections and/or reunification.	Family Support Services
Supportive Visitation	This program refers to contact between a non-custodial parent/family member(s) and one or more of his or her children in the presence of a UMFS Worker. The primary responsibility for the visit is to provide a structured, therapeutic environment where the child(ren)/parent/family member(s) are working toward identified treatment goals established by the parent/family member(s), the Department of Social Services, and the UMFS Worker conducting the visit. Family Stabilization	<p>UMFS Family Stabilization Services improve family functioning and increase child well-being by providing individualized, flexible services to meet a family's specific needs. This service may be provided in order to maintain or reunify families. Family Stabilization Services are customized to meet the child/family's individual needs. This service is available to children and youth, birth through 21 years.</p>	Family Support Services
Comprehensive Case Coordination	<p>Comprehensive Case Coordination (CCC) is a stabilization service offered to a family who requires assistance with linking the services needed to stabilize the family, and ensure the safety, permanency, and well-being of the child. This service is provided to families with children ages birth to 21. This program mirrors the level of services of Treatment Foster Care and is intended for youth who do not meet the requirements for Treatment Foster Care. Youth can be in birth homes, LDSS placements, adoptive homes, kinship or fictive kin homes. Functional Family Therapy	<p>FFT is a short-term, high quality intervention program with an average of 12 to 14 sessions over three to five months. FFT works primarily with 11- to 18-year-old youth who have been</p>	Functional Family Therapy

	<p>referred for behavioral or emotional problems by the juvenile justice, mental health, and school or child welfare systems. Services are conducted in both clinic and home settings, and can also be provided in schools, child welfare facilities, probation and parole offices/aftercare systems and mental health facilities.</p> <p>FFT is a strength-based model built on a foundation of acceptance and respect. At its core is a focus on assessment and intervention to address risk and protective factors within and outside of the family that impact the adolescent and his or her adaptive development.</p> <p>FFT consists of five major components: engagement, motivation, relational assessment, behavior change and generalization. Each of these components has its own goals, focus and intervention strategies and techniques.</p> <p>FFT is billed per day as noted on the rate sheet. <u>Payments shall be made in increments of days, with all days from initiation of services to discharge from services being continuously billable, even if there were not actual services delivered on a specific day.</u></p>	
Parenting Educational Group: Collaborative Problem Solving	<p>The Collaborative Problem Solving® approach is an evidence-based method to manage challenging behavior that promotes the understanding that challenging kids lack the skill - not the will - to behave. Specifically, kids lack much-needed skills related to problem-solving, flexibility and frustration tolerance. Unlike traditional models of discipline, the CPS approach avoids the use of power, control and motivational procedures and instead focuses on collaborating with the child/youth/young adult to solve the problems leading to challenging behavior and building the skills they need to succeed.
