Community Based Services – Service Descriptions
July 1, 2024 – June 30, 2025

Intensive In-Home Services: Services for children/adolescents under the age of 21. Services are intensive, time-limited interventions provided typically but not solely in the residence of a child who is at-risk of being moved into an out of home placement or who is being transitioned to the home from an out of home placement due to documented clinical needs of the child. These services provide crisis treatment, individual and family counseling and communication skills (e.g. counseling to assist the child and his parent to understand and practice appropriate problem-solving, anger management, and interpersonal interactions, etc.) and coordination with other required services. Services also included 24-hour emergency response.

Supportive In-home Services: Support and other structured services provided to strengthen individual skills and or provide environmental supports for individuals with behavioral/mental health problems. Services are based on the needs of the individual and include training and assistance.

Family Centered Therapy: Family Centered Treatment (FCT) is an evidence-based and well-supported trauma treatment model of home-based family therapy. The primary utilization of this service is for stabilization of the family/prevention of removal from home and reunification should a youth be placed in foster/kin/congregate care. Applying practical, experiential, and common-sense solutions, FCT is designed to increase family health and well-being, promote attachment and resiliency among members, and develop functional solutions for maladaptive patterns (behavior). FCT builds upon family strengths and addresses individual and family trauma by addressing underlying causes, not just the symptoms. Mental Health Skill-Building Service: A training service for individuals with significant psychiatric functional limitations. Services are designed to train individuals in functions skills and appropriate behavior related to the individual's health and safety, activities of daily living and use of community resources, assistance with medication management and monitoring health, nutrition, and physical condition. These services are intended to enable individual with significant mental illness to achieve and maintain community stability and independence in the most appropriate, least restrictive environment.

Parent Coaching & Mentoring: Using the KEYS community-based model, this prevention service empowers caregivers with the knowledge and tools necessary to parent effectively and with confidence while maintaining a healthy, nurturing relationship with their child. During home-based sessions, staff provide remedial review of evidence-based curriculum information, model parenting skills, role-play parenting techniques with the caregiver, facilitate opportunities for caregivers to begin practicing healthy parenting strategies within their parent-child relationship, and tailor their intervention to meet the unique needs of each caregiver.

Therapeutic Mentoring: Therapeutic Mentoring is available to all school-aged children under the age of 21. Transitional specialists focus on life skills proficiency, anger management, social skills training, leadership, and academic support. Included in this category are Casey Life Skills (CLS) assessments and related services. This service can be considered for work with the special needs' population, including autism. This is a 1:1 service.

Specialized School Support (1:1): Provided by a QMHP level staff in the classroom setting, services include individualized support with classroom support to decrease disruptive behaviors, crisis intervention, processing of maladaptive behaviors, development of prosocial skill development in the classroom setting, ADL skills, as needed, for students struggling with independence, and assistance in transition between classes. Minimum of 2 hours per day.

Head Start Observation: Clinical observation of a classroom where the teacher(s) have noted difficulty in managing specific students or groups of students. Includes provision of recommendations for each student in question and recommendations provided to the Head Start Supervisor of classroom management that may improve potential client response to situations. Completed by a LMHP or RIC/SW-S. Includes 2 hours billable time for the observation and paperwork. Note: Mileage is calculated as 1 mile = 1 minute for billing purposes.

Supervised Visitation: Supervised visitation is one-to-one supervision where HCA staff ensure the safety of the children and all visitor(s) as well as provide basic information to help facilitate parent/child interactions by offering minimal suggestions, such as age-appropriate developmental expectations and interventions. Report provided.

Transportation: Staff are matched with clients, according to their needs. As transportation cases vary with each client (depending on distance and all variables involved), HCA charges a flat hourly rate to and from destinations.

ABA Services – Service Descriptions

Initial Behavior Assessment – Completed by Board Certified Behavior Analyst, Board-Certified Assistant Behavior Analyst, or a Licensed Mental Health Professional. Service is to determine appropriateness of ABA therapy and develop initial treatment plan. Includes direct and indirect assessment of client, interview with family members and other service providers, development of treatment plan, and determination of treatment frequency.

Direct ABA Services by RBT/BT (1:1) – Direct implementation of ABA treatment plan by a Registered Behavior Technician or ABA Behavior Tech.

Supervision / Program Development / ABA Care Coordination / Parent or Staff Training by BCBA / BCaBA – Encompasses work completed by BCBA/BCaBA on an on-going basis for client, including supervision of RBT/BT (simultaneously with services), ongoing program development and treatment plan updating, parent and caregiver training, and other required services such as direct observation and feedback. Occurs at 10-20% of direct service hours. A BCBA/BCaBA leads an interdisciplinary team to determine how to best support the child's needs through the individualization of established goals and outcomes across various settings and with different clinicians; and/or one-on-one professional coordination with educators; and/or participation in other meetings as requested by referring agencies such as IEPs.

Registered Behavior Technician – a paraprofessional, who completed the RBT certification, assists in delivering behavior analysis services and practices under the direction and close supervision of an RBT Supervisor.
