What Role does VDH Play in the Dairy Industry as Defined by Public Health

Dairy Technical Specialists assure that Grade "A" Dairy Products meet the FDA and State of Virginia's regulatory standards through the following:

- Identity Labeling
- Plant Cleanliness and Sanitation
- Pasteurization
- Product Analysis Sampling
- Education & Training
- Containers/Bottling

These standards are set forth utilizing the following:

- FDA Pasteurized Milk Ordinance (PMO)
- Code of Federal Regulations (21 CFR)
- Virginia State Code (2VAC 5-490)











One of the largest Grade A milk producing facilities in the United States and the largest on the east coast resides in our district in Frederick County.

- > 500,000 + sq ft under roof
- ► 635 Employees
- ➤ 185,000 Gallons of Grade A Milk Products produced per day
- > 5.7 Million Gallons per Month
- Ongoing expansion increasing production capabilities

60% of LFHD's Dairy program's regulatory requirements are dedicated to this facility which operates 24/7, 365 days per year.








Slated to open in Frederick County, VA early 2025






Community Health Assessment

A community health assessment (CHA) is a careful, systematic examination of the health status of the community that is used to identify key health problems and assets in the community.

The data from the assessment will inform decision-making, prioritization of health problems, and development of plans to improve the health of the community.

Planned CHA Assessments

Community Status Assessment

Quantitative, primary data, such as:

- Demographics
- Access to Care
- Health Behaviors
- Social determinants of health

Community Partner Assessment

- ~10 minute survey completed by partner organizations
- Provides a view of the strengths and assets in our community.

Secondary data, including rates of disease and other social determinants, will be used to make a comparison between the perceived community concerns and available existing data.

Mobile Health Unit

The Lord Fairfax Health District was a recipient of a community engagement grant in 2023 and one of our goals is to improve access to health services in rural areas of the district.

After conducting focus groups across the district, it was determined that a mobile health unit may be a good solution for some of these issues!

Coming early 2025, the health district will have a mobile health unit to be able to provide health department services to more areas of the district.

Our goal is to provide more equitable access to our services with this mobile health unit.



CHEMPACK Program – What is it?

- A National program under the Department of Health & Human Services (HHS)
- CHEMPACK program began as an initiative of CDC's Division of Strategic National Stockpile (SNS) and has since moved to the Administration for Strategic Preparedness and Response (ASPR)
- Intent: Forward placed medications throughout the country available to hospitals and local first responders to quickly treat persons exposed to nerve agents.

What medications are included?

Atropine Sulfate - which blocks the effects of excess acetylcholine at its site of action **Pralidoxime (2PAM)** - which reactivates the acetylcholine esterase and therefore reduces the levels of acetylcholine.

Diazepam – which reduces the severity of acetylcholine induced convulsions, which can cause long-term mental effects.



CHEMPACK Program – LFHD's Cache Sites

The Lord Fairfax Health District currently has a total of three Chempack containers.

EMS containers:

- Geared towards first responders
- 85% autoinjectors
- Estimates casualty capacity=454
- For the state of Virginia, there are 42 EMS containers Hospital containers:
- Geared to clinical care environments
- 85% multi-dose vials
- Estimated casualty capacity=1,000
- For the state of Virginia, there are 8 hospital containers





CHEMPACK Program – T & E Development

LFHD recently collaborated with all six jurisdictions to successfully develop a Chempack Guidance Policy. The overarching goal is to ensure there is awareness and knowledge surrounding the availability of this asset, how to properly store, access, transport, and administer the medications included.

Tabletop exercises were conducted in 2023 which involved Law Enforcement, Emergency Management, Fire & Rescue, the VA Department of Emergency Management Region II, Valley Health key personnel, and more.

A Drill was conducted in May of 2024

A Full-Scale Exercise will be facilitated in February of 2025 out of the Winchester Medical Center, along with a field response from the Frederick County Fairgrounds. This will be one of the first Chempack FSEs to be completed in the state.


2024 Data for Frederick County

- 10 outbreaks investigated
- 560 cases of reportable disease* (not including COVID-19)
 - Most reported conditions: chlamydia and Lyme disease
- 16 site visits and outreach events



iGAS & STSS

- Cases of iGAS and STSS increasing in VA and LFHD
 - o 5-year case average for LFHD: 12
 - o Cases in 2024 for LFHD: 20*
- LFHD requested notice from VDH central office
- Local outreach to HCPs and high-risk populations
- Rapid response/intervention to cases reported from LTCFs





Disease Preparedness


- Still no human cases of highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) A(H5N1) in VA
- Jan. 16: VDACS issued a <u>news release</u> announcing H5N1 was detected in a commercial poultry flock on the Eastern Shore of VA
 - VDH is collaborating with VDACS on public health response related to detection
- LFHD will continue outreach to high-risk populations and healthcare providers
 - Human testing of H5N1 is available through the state lab for suspect cases
 - Clinician letter to come with VA specific guidance related to the <u>CDC's</u> recommendation to accelerate subtyping of positive influenza A tests



Respiratory Illness

Respiratory illness is tracked using:

- Syndromic surveillance of ED and urgent care visits (ESSENCE)
- Reported lab results
- Outbreaks
- Death certificates



Respiratory Illness

- National and statewide increase in pediatric pneumonia cases reported in 2024
- Outreach to schools and healthcare providers conducted


Pertussis

- VDH reported increase in pertussis cases in Aug. 2024, increase also observed in LFHD
 - Notification of increase sent to HCPs in LFHD in Sep.
- An increase in cases in LFHD was identified in Fall 2024
 - Another notification sent to HCPs and schools in Nov.
 - Extensive contact tracing conducted for each case
- District Epi conducted in-person outreach to multiple organizations emphasizing prevention measures and encouraging vaccination






Syphilis Rates by Diagnosis Year- Virginia






Virginia Congenital Syphilis Trends, 2013-2023


Maternal Risk Factors in CS Diagnoses 2018-2023, Virginia

Syphilis - Key Facts

- Genital ulcerative sexually transmitted infection caused by the bacterium *Treponema pallidum*
- Causes systemic disease
- Highly infectious (particularly early stages)
- Significant complications if left untreated
- Can facilitate the transmission and acquisition of HIV infection
- Untreated syphilis in pregnant women can lead to infection of the fetus in up to 80% of cases and may result in stillbirth or infant death in up to 40% of cases

- The agreement is in the Code of Virginia under 32.1-31
 - § 32.1-31. Operation of local health department under contract with Board; local health services advisory boards; district health departments.
 - A. The governing body of any county or city may enter into a contract with the Board for the operation of the local health department in such county or city.

FY26 Budget Increase

For FY25 we requested \$543,147. The approved Budget was for \$507,110. We had to ask for an additional \$6,933 to be provided by Frederick County Government to be able to get the state match of \$639,501
